Mobile Crisis Outreach

• C.O.P.E (Community Outreach for Psychiatric Emergencies) is a 24-hour, community-based, face-to-face Mobile Crisis Stabilization Teams that provides services in emergency departments to the residents of Wayne County experiencing a behavioral health crisis. Autism Benefits

- Autism Spectrum Disorder is a developmental disability caused by a problem in the brain. To receive ABA services in Wayne County, the child must be screened. Either the child's Primary Care Physician or the Detroit Wayne Mental Health (DWMHA) Access Center can help start this process.
- ABA is an intensive, behaviorally-based treatment that uses various techniques to bring about meaningful and positive changes in the communication, social interaction, and repetitive/ restrictive behaviors that are typical of ASD.
- DWMHA works with eight ASD Benefit Providers and offers services to individuals younger than 21.
